

Esashi-Fujiwara Heritage Park

Esashi-Fujiwara Heritage Park is located near the World Cultural Heritage Site, Hiraizumi. The theme park allows visitors to experience the history and culture of Tohoku from ancient times to the Middle Ages while honoring the great achievements of the Northern Fujiwara Clan. The park has replicated more than 120 historic buildings based on rigorous historical accuracy. It has been used as the filming location for many NHK Taiga drama series and movies.

Hiraizumi -Temples, Gardens and Archaeological Sites Representing the Buddhist Pure Land

Many ruins still stand in Hiraizumi and the surrounding area, such as Buddhist temples and gardens that were built by the Northern Fujiwara Clan in the late Heian period. These include the national treasure, Konjiki Hall (Golden Hall) of Chuson Temple, and the place of special scenic beauty, Pure Land Garden at Motsu Temple. The representations of the ideal world in Hiraizumi, depicted by the temples and gardens, have no equal. "Hiraizumi-Temples, Gardens and Archaeological Sites Representing the Buddhist Pure Land" was registered as a World Heritage Site in June 2011.

Ryusen Cave

Ryusen Cave is among one of the big three limestone caverns in Japan, along with Shuho Cave in Yamaguchi Prefecture and Ryuga Cave in Kochi Prefecture. Today, approximately 700 m of the cave is open to the public, but as much as 3600 m has been explored. In total, it is surmised to be more than 5000 m in length. Its seclusion amplifies the mystery of the cave. Incredible large underground lakes are filled with crystal-clear blue water.

Hachimantai snow corridor

Hachimantai is a national park visited by around 700,000 people each year, and Hachimantai Aspite Line is a road running near the summit of Mt. Hachimantai at a height of 1613 m. In mid April, giant walls of snow are created that stand approximately 8 m high. The 27 km-long "snow corridor," the longest in Japan, is perfect for an early spring drive.

Sendai Tanabata Festival

This festival is held for three days each year, on August 6th, 7th, and 8th. The city bustles with a crowd of over two million people. The gorgeous decorations made from bamboo are not to be missed. Distinctive to Sendai Tanabata are the Seven Ornaments also on display, consisting of strips of paper and paper garments. This traditional star festival is held for the many wishes of people for blessings such as the wellbeing of one's family and good health. The Sendai Tanabata Festival Fireworks Display is held on the 5th.

Izunuma and Uchinuma

This is one of the three wetlands in the northern part of Miyagi prefecture that are registered under the Ramsar Convention. In summer, the entire lake is covered with lotus in bloom, and every year in August the Lotus Festival is held where people can view the lotus blooms up close from a sightseeing boat. In addition, in winter it becomes a prominent wintering spot for over 100,000 migratory birds. The sight of greater white-fronted geese taking flight in early morning and coming home to roost in the evening is spectacular.

Matsushima Shidaikan

The views from the four directions, east, west, north, and south from hilltops in Matsushima Bay are called Matsushima Shidaikan. They are considered amazing panoramic viewpoints, each with a different character. Otaka-mori (city of Higashimatsushima) is called sokan (spectacular view), Tomi-yama (town of Matsushima) is called reikan (beautiful view), Tamon-zan (town of Shichigahama) is called ikan (magnificent view), and Ogi-dani (town of Matsushima) is called yukan (subtle view). Visitors can also see changes to the bay stemming from the earthquake, such as the restored oyster beds.



Naruko Gorge

Naruko Gorge is a vast valley 100 m deep that was forged by land uplift and erosion from the Otani River. A rest house affords a spectacular view of the 70 m-high bridge spanning the gorge. Funaoka Joshi Park and Shiroishi Riverside Hitomesenbon Sakura

This well-known spot was chosen as one of Japan's top 100 cherry blossom viewing sites—the only such site in Miyagi prefecture. It began with Takayama Kaijiro, a businessman from the town of Ogawara, who wanted to recreate the famous cherry blossom site in Asukayama, Tokyo in his own hometown. From the Taisho era to the Showa period he planted approximately 1,200 cherry trees. The Shibata Cherry Blossom Festival held every year in April is bustling with over 250,000 visitors from Japan and abroad who come to view the cherry blossoms. The cherry trees spread over two towns, Ogawara and Shibata. A cherry blossom festival is held every April in both towns, bringing in crowds of over 500,000 people from both within and without Japan.

Matsushima Ryutoe Uminobon

After the Great East Japan Earthquake in 2011, young local residents wishing to hold a requiem and memorial service on the sacred ground of Matsushima created this festival that is rooted in the landscape, history, and temple town culture. This is a summer event that values the traditions of the memorial service and toro nagashi (floating lanterns), while enjoying the energy of a local summer festival that includes commemorative fireworks and the bon dance. Both children and adults alike naturally find themselves smiling during this event. On August 16th, approximately 50 priests from the national treasure, Zuigan Temple recite sutras during the 700-year old tradition of Osegakie. In 2012, the festival received the Good Design Award.

Zao Okama (crater)

Zao Mountain Range is part of the Ou Mountains straddling Yamagata and Miyagi prefectures. Mt. Kumanodake is the highest peak on this site, which is one of Japan's foremost quasi-national parks. The landscape is beautiful throughout the four seasons. The round crater lake surrounded by the 3 peaks of Kattadake, Kumanodake, and Goshikidake is filled with emerald green water. It is called Okama because it is shaped like a caldron. In summer, the "queen of the alpine plants," Dicentra peregrine blooms in the vicinity of Kumanodake summit and Komakusadaira Plateau in Miyagi prefecture. The area is also a popular spot for trekking.

Akita Kanto Festival

This festival is a national important intangible folk cultural asset. 46 lanterns are hung from poles 12 m in length and manipulated with amazing skill in the palm of the hand and on the forehead, shoulders, and back. One of the three biggest festivals in Tohoku, this event pray for a huge harvest and it's said to be held over 260 years. Approximately 270 poles brightly light up the night sky.

Yokote no Kamakura

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Cherry blossoms at samurai residences in Kakunodate

The area from Omote-machi to Higashi-katsuraku-cho is lined with samurai residences, and there are about 400 weeping cherry trees on both sides of the street that look splendid set against Yakui Gate and black board fences. The streetscape of samurai homes paired with the weeping cherry trees presents an eloquent scene not only during cherry blossom season, but also throughout the year—when the cherry blossoms have fallen and new greenery emerges, and when the fall colors turn into a winter snowscape.

Yamagata Hanagasa Festival

This is one of the four big festivals of Tohoku. It is held for three days every year from August 5th to 7th. With a dance troupe performing a traditional dance in perfect sync at the lead, many dancers holding hats adorned with safflower (the flower of Yamagata prefecture and Yamagata City) dance beautifully in groups down the city center to the sound of the traditional hanagasa ballad and hanagasa drums (165 groups, approx. 14,000 people, participated in 2015).

Hojusan Risshaku-ji Temple (Yamadera Temple)

This is an ancient temple of the Tendai sect of Buddhism that was founded by Jikaku Daishi (Ennin) in 860. It is also famous for the poet, Matsuo Basho's haiku, "Deep silence, the shrill of cicadas, seeps into rocks." Along the 1,015 stone steps that continue from the trailhead, there are strange rocks, stone monuments, and stone images of Buddha. The view seen from Godai Hall throughout the four seasons, including the spring greenery and fall colors, is spellbinding.

Dewa Sanzan (Mt. Gassan, Mt. Haguro, Mt. Yudono)

Dewa Sanzan is the collective name for Mt. Gassan, Mt. Haguro, and Mt. Yudono, and since ancient times has been known as a sacred place for shugendo (mountain asceticism). Approximately 1400 years ago, Prince Hachiko who was the son of the 32nd emperor of Japan, Emperor Sushun, was led there by a three-legged sacred bird. He climbed Mt. Gassan, Mt. Haguro, and Mt. Yudono to worship and founded the mountains as religious centers. Since then, it has spread throughout Japan as Haguro shugendo.

This is a famous site for flowers that was called "paradise on earth in Fukushima" by the late renowned Japanese photographer, Akiyama Shotaro. In spring, flowers such as plum blossoms, peach blossoms, cherry blossoms, weeping forsythia, Japanese quince, and lily magnolia bloom one after another. The contrast of the blooming flowers with the snow remaining on the Agatsuma mountain range in the west is spectacular. Local farmers kindly open their private land to the public, and every year many tourists come to enjoy the beautiful sight.

With National Rt. 13 serving as the venue, lively dances are performed to the music of "Heisei Waraji Ondo" and "Dancing Soda Night." On the second day, the energetic events of Owaraji and Waraji Kyoso take place. The former involves a huge straw sandal, while the latter involves competing to pull floats the fastest.

Tsuruga Castle

Tsuruga Castle is said to have originated approximately 630 years ago when Ashina Naomori built Higashi Kurokawa Castle, the predecessor to the castle. The famous castle came to be known by the nation when it withstood fierce fighting for about a month during the Boshin War. In 2011, reroofing of the red roof tile was completed to recreate its appearance during the days of the Tokugawa shogunate. The current castle tower is the only one in Japan that has a red tiled roof.

Iwaki Kaiten Yagura Bon Dance Festival

The rotating tower, the only one of its kind in Japan, was built in imitation of the national treasure, Shiramizu Amida Hall. The 12 m high, 10 m wide tower is powered by electricity. It is beautifully adorned with decorative illumination and lanterns, and is a truly wonderful sight at dusk. In addition to taiko drums and accompanying music, this festival features concentric circles of dancers on top of and around the tower. This bon festival welcomes anyone who wants to participate.

Sannokura Highland flower fields

Across approximately 8 ha that includes the Sannokura Ski Area overlooking the Aizu Basin, rape blossoms bloom in spring, while the greatest number of sunflowers and cosmos in Tohoku (approx. two million) bloom from summer to fall. Visitors can enjoy viewing flowers throughout the four seasons. The carpet of flowers spreading out below and the picturesque scene woven by nature is so beautiful it is breathtaking. A hill with a fantastic view has a "happiness bell," so named after the rape blossoms and sunflowers. Try making a wish and ringing the bell.

Soma Nomaoi

Every year for three days on the last Saturday, Sunday, and Monday of July, this traditional event is held by municipalities in the Soma region, the three shrines of Soma Nakamura Shrine (city of Soma), Ota Shrine (Hara, city of Minamisoma), and Odaka Shrine (Odaka, city of Minamisoma), and Soma groups in each district. In 1978, it was designated a national important intangible folk-cultural property. After a formal ceremony with the military commander held at Nakamura Shrine, a horseback riding procession featuring the military commander and an imperial carriage departs. The event gives a sense of history and power.

People are captivated by the rough volcanic walls associated with great damage due to volcanic eruptions, and the dynamic landscape represented by over 300 lakes and marshes produced by those eruptions. Goshikinuma (5-colored ponds) was chosen as a fall scene that Japan wants to share with the world. Cidre

The "land of apples," Hirosaki boasts the greatest production of apples in the country and is where sparkling apple wine called cidre originated in Japan. There are many to choose from, including the pioneer of cidre in Japan, Nikka. There are also local cidres produced by farmers that carry out the entire process, from growing the apples to brewing the wine, such as Tamura Farm and Hirosaki Cidre Kobo kimori. Ichigoni

This clear soup features sea urchin and abalone. It was originally made from sea urchin and abalone caught in waters near Hachinohe and simmered in seawater. It is said to be called ichigoni (simmered strawberries) because the golden colored sea urchin in the milky white soup looks just like wild strawberries in the morning haze. Residents of Hachinohe enjoy cooking rice with canned ichigoni.



There are many canned ichigoni products, but dried ichigoni makes a convenient souvenir. When I presented it to a foreigner he cooked it with rice and loved the taste.



Oma tuna

The town of Oma is located at the northernmost point of Honshu and is the shortest distance to Hokkaido at 17.5 km. Hakodate can be reached by ferry in 90 minutes. Everything about the town is impacted by single line fishing for tuna. In fact, it is said that half the town's residents are fishermen. Hammering by the rough waves of the Tsugaru Channel produces tuna with firm meat that has fetched a price of 155.4 million yen at the opening-day auction at Tsukiji in Tokyo.
