Trends in the Diet

The Inter-party Conference Committee of Both Houses on the Relocation of the National Diet and Related Organizations

The meeting of the Inter-party Conference Committee of Both Houses on the Relocation of the National Diet and Related Organizations was held from 10 a.m. to 10:50 a.m. on July 9. The Directors of the Houses' Research Offices presented the interim reports produced by the Houses' Special Committees on the Relocation of the National Diet and Related Organizations. Also, there was a question and answer session among the Committee members, concerning the details of priority relocation which was described in the report of the House of Councilors, and concerning dispersal relocation which was described in the report of the House of Representatives.

House of Representatives

From July 31 to August 7 in 2003, the delegation of the members of the House of Representatives for the investigation of the relocation of the legislative bodies and related organizations in Korea and Europe has been sent to Korea, the Netherlands, and Sweden to investigate the relocations of their legislative bodies and related organizations. 2. Investigation summaries

(1) Korea

In Korea, President Roh Moo-hyun won the presidential election on his pledge to construct a new administrative capital in Ch'ungch'ong-do Province, the central western area of the country, and preparation is progressing. The delegation interviewed the government's Support Team for the Construction of the New Administrative Capital on the current situation and future schedule. The delegation also interviewed concerned members of Parliament on the attitude of Parliament as a whole. Also, the delegation investigated the relocation of eleven government bodies, including central government Ministries, to the Kwach'on Government Buildings on the outskirts of Seoul, which started in 1982.

(2) The Netherlands

The Constitution of the Netherlands defines Amsterdam as the capital. Parliament, government offices, and the Supreme Court, however, are located in The Hague. The delegation interviewed government officials of the Ministry of the Interior and members of Parliament, investigated the reasons and the current conditions for having capital function apart from the constitutional capital, and investigated the decentralization of the country's administrative bodies.



(2) Sweden

From the 1970s to 1985, the central administrative organizations of Sweden were dispersed from Stockholm to provincial cities. The delegation interviewed government officials of the Ministry of Industry, Employment, Communications and transport and members of the Center Party, which put great effort into this matter, and investigated the reasons, purposes, impact, and other elements of the dispersal relocation.





Korean delegation visited the Ministry of Land, Infrastructure and Transport

A delegation from Korea, where the government is working on constructing their new administrative capital, with most of its members from the Support Team for the Construction of the New Administrative Capital, the government division in charge, visited the Capital Function Relocation Planning Division of the MLIT, and exchanged information on the current situations concerning relocation in the two countries.

The Support Team presented how they are addressing the matter in Korea and their future schedule. The summary of their presentation is as follows:

- In order to promote constructing the new administrative capital, the Project Team for the Construction of the New Administrative Capital was set up in April this year at Cheong Wa Dae, the Office of the President. Also, the Support Team for the Construction of the New Administrative Capital was set up in the Ministry of Construction and Transportation (the counterpart of the Japanese MLIT) in order to support the Project Team.
- As for the future schedule, the Special Act for the Construction of the New Administrative Capital will be presented to this year's regular session of Parliament (from September to December), the criteria for the candidate



sites will be drawn up, and the sites will be investigated by experts. Then, the site for the new administrative capital will be selected in the latter half of 2004, and construction will start in the latter half of 2007.

As described above, the preparation for constructing the new administrative capital is making steady headway. We should keep our eyes on their future progress.
