~ Think Together about the Relocation of the National Diet and Related Organizations ~

Recent moves concerning the relocation of the administrative capital in Korea

In South Korea, the Constitutional Court ruled on October 21 that the Special Act for the Administrative Capital Relocation, which provides the legal basis for relocating the administrative capital, was unconstitutional.

This was the result of a petition submitted by a group of 169 people, including Seoul city councilors and university professors. The group says the Special Act pushed forward the relocation of the administrative capital without the necessary amendment to the Constitution. Therefore, the entire Special Act was unconstitutional, violating people's basic rights, which include the right to vote in a national referendum.

The verdict ruled the Special Act was against the constitution, saying, "Seoul has status as the capital of Korea by custom, which is an unwritten part of the constitution. The Special Act revises this status by passing a bill without following the proper procedures required for revising the constitution. Thus, the entire Special Act violates the rights of the people, including the plaintiffs, to vote in a national referendum as required for revising the constitution."

After the verdict, the Presidential Committee on Administrative Capital Relocation, which was established according to the Special Act to relocate the administrative capital, completely suspended its activities.

Recent Major Activities Related to Relocating the National Diet and Related Organizations in Each Region

- The three candidate sites of the Tochigi-Fukushima, Gifu-Aichi, and Mie-Kio regions jointly made a brochure in October, 2004 in order to encourage public opinion to relocate capital functions.
- Promotion booths were placed at the station plaza of JR Kyoto Station on September 1 and 2, and at the event space of Iga Koga Local Product Market held in Ueno City on September 4 and 5. A public-relations campaign for capital function relocation was also conducted. The campaign was sponsored by the Koga Higashi-Omi Committee for Capital Function Relocation to the Mie-Kio Region and the Iga Region Capital Function Relocation Council, and was cosponsored by the Mie and Shiga Prefectural Governments.
- The Tochigi Prefectural Residents' Meeting for the Relocation of the National Diet and Related Organizations had a promotion corner at the Tochigi Housing Fair 2004, which was held in Utsunomiya City from October 15 to 17, 2004.
