What is Fair Housing?

Fair housing is the right of all people to be free from discrimination in the rental, sale, or financing of housing.

History of Fair Housing



- 1948: Supreme Court rules racially restrictive covenants unenforceable
- 1950s-1960s: states and localities pass laws in response to increasing patterns of segregation
- 1968: Federal Fair Housing Act passed
- 1974: Act amended to include sex
- 1988: Act amended to included stronger enforcement efforts, and disability & familial status protections

Discrimination under the Fair Housing Act

- Discrimination means being treated <u>differently</u> than others (not all discrimination is illegal)
- Illegal Discrimination = Covered Issue + Covered Basis

Covered Basis: race; color; religion; sex; national origin; disability; and familial status.

Fair Housing Act- Covered Issues

In the sale or rental of housing, it is illegal to:

- Refuse to rent, sell, or negotiate;
- Provide different terms and conditions
- Advertise or make any statement expressing a limitation or preference.

In **lending**, illegal to refuse to make available or purchase a mortgage, provide information, or impose different loan terms or conditions, brokerage services


Illegal to threaten, coerce, intimidate, or interfere with anyone assisting in or exercising a fair housing right

"Equal Use and Enjoyment"

- Generally, people cannot be denied housing because they require a <u>disability related need</u>.
 - Disability: impairment that substantially limits a major life activity (caring for oneself, performing tasks, hearing, eating, sleeping, walking)
- Reasonable Accommodations: change in rules, policies, practices, or services (parking, caregivers, animals, payment date)
- Reasonable Modifications: physical structural changes to a dwelling or common area (ramps, grabbars, bathrooms).
- Accessibility Standards: Fair Housing Act Design Manual created standards for all newly constructed, multifamily housing (4+ units).







Housing for Older Persons

- Fair Housing Act: familial status exemption if:
 - HUD certification
 - Intended for, and solely occupied by 62+
 - Intended and operated for occupancy 55+ (>80%)
- Nondiscrimination on the basis of age in HUD programs or activities receiving federal financial assistance
 - The Age Discrimination Act of 1975
- Policy to collaborate with other federal, state, and local partners to better coordinate tying affordable housing with voluntary supportive services
 - Should be voluntary (mandates can create barriers or loss of housing opportunity)

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Works to eliminate housing discrimination, promote economic opportunity, and achieve diverse, inclusive communities.

- Enforcement
- Technical assistance and training
- Education and Outreach

Enforcement


- Complaints originate from members of the public, systemic, Secretary-initiated
 - Conciliation (settlement) for individual and public interest relief
 - Investigation (determination on facts)
 - Charge in court and/or adjudicate administratively
- Enforce with the help of State and local agency partners
 - Fair Housing Assistance Program

FHEO Programs and Compliance

- Monitor affirmative requirements tied to federal funding
 - Ensure accessibility and supportive services with individuals with disabilities
 - Provide meaningful access to their programs and translation for persons with limited English proficiency
 - Nondiscrimination based on age and housing for elderly
 - Equal access for LGBTQ+
- Conduct Compliance Reviews
- Offer Technical Assistance and Training
